Abstract Information

Abstracts may highlight original research, quality improvement projects, evidence-based practice, or practice/educational innovations. Submissions should reflect the conference theme Beyond the Horizon: Educating Nurses with Purpose and Vision.

Complete and submit the online form in full. Only one submission per presentation will be reviewed. See specific details regarding abstract submission requirements, tracks, and presentation types below. Individuals may submit multiple different abstracts, but presenters are limited to 2 presentations at the Conference.

Communications will be directed to the designated **Contact Person ONLY**. The Contact Person will receive a confirmation receipt of abstract submission.

If the abstract is accepted, presentation materials, short biographies, and headshots of all presenters are required to be uploaded to Whova (the official conference app). Information will be sent to the Contact Person ONLY. By submitting an abstract, you are confirming that at least 1 presenter will register and pay for the NEC Conference in full.
